First Steps

Know Your Club. Renovations can be tough because it's necessary to strike a

balance between the original charm of the facility and an upgrade that will excite and delight all members. Is your club of historical or traditional style and are you looking to maintain the ambience? Or are you looking for a brand new atmosphere with a modern, state-of-the-art twist? When renovating, it's important to set the tone of the upgrade and be consistent throughout all spaces of the facility. Create your vision and work with architects and interior designers to craft your master plan.

Communicate with your

1. Dining Spaces. Dining spaces are some of the most important spaces in a country club both socially and financially. All members regardless of age want a nice place to be social and gather with friends and other members. Now a days, it's imperative that country clubs have several dining facilities to suit the needs of various demographics. Older generations tend to enjoy a more sophisticated or fancy experience, while younger generations or families with young children may want a more causal quick dining option. It's extremely important to create a dining setting that is comfortable and inviting to all members. 2. Bars. It's no secret that people gravitate towards a good bar. Bars are a wonderful place to gather, whether it's a beer with a few buddies after 18 holes of golf, or a nice glass of wine before an elegant dinner. Bars in country clubs can be both sophisticated and casual depending on the demographic you trying to draw. It's important to create a



pleasant and comfortable place for a drink (maybe in a Eustis Bar Stool?).





3. Golf Course. If your Country Club has a golf course, consider revamping it. Along with the upkeep of the greenery, your golf course may need a few tweaks. As we progress technologically as consumers, we expect more and more technology—especially younger members. Can you add technology to your course or golf

clubhouse? Can you add to the course to make your course a hot spot for tournaments or events? The golf course can be a great source of revenue and potential renovations might separate you from other golf courses in the area.

4. Pool. Often, country clubs have a hard time catering to families with young kids. Country clubs have a reputation of primarily attending to older folks. And while this is important, it's equally important to create family friendly facilities. The addition or renovation of the country club pool has huge potential for an increase in revenue. Pools are a natural social hub and where people gather, food and drinks follow. Does your pool have the parameters to create a swim team and host swim meets? Does it have a poolside snack area or bar? In addition, young members that have grown up around the club and have had positive memories and experiences are likely to become



members when they are adults or have families of their own, keeping your country club experience alive.



5. Tennis Courts. Tennis courts are another option for social engagement or an influx of traffic to the club. The more activities there are for members to partake in, the more time they'll spend at your facilities. Tennis courts may also create an opportunity for revenue in lessons or children's camps. Can you create country club tennis teams and host matches? Can you bring in non-members that are interested in tennis lessons?



6. Gathering/Conference Spaces.

Country Clubs that have large spaces for venues have the potential to create revenue by renting out large spaces. Few clubs or venues can suit big events or parties, so make your venue a local go-to. In our opinion, of course, the ability to provide enough seating that is comfortable yet beautiful is the most important component to an elite event

space, stackable chairs are a great way to maximize your space. We specialize in stacking (and non-stacking) chairs that stack 8 chairs high and will allow you to seat the whole conference with ease.

7. Outdoor Spaces. What is more picturesque than watching the sunset on an terrace or outdoor seating area? Having a well-designed and outfitted outdoor seating area will bring in more business by bringing in more traffic. Members love to order a drink (maybe at a new outdoor



bar?) and spend a couple hours hanging out with their friends enjoying the fresh air. The addition or renovation of an outdoor area may also bring opportunities for event hosting, parties, or activities.



How Many Eustis Chairs Can Fit in a Closet?

One of the benefits of our hardwood stacking chairs is new storage capabilities, as our chairs will take up less space than the average seating. To fully test this, we decided to see how many of our chairs will fit within a 9 ft by 6 ft closet, which seems to be common for our club and university clients. In the photos you can see our Merrimac models, which we have stacked ten high. For most of our stackable models we recommend stacking six to eight chairs, although up to ten is fine for chairs without arms.

The Results. After stacking, ten chairs take up about 36 inches by 18 inches of space. The 3' length was measured by how far out the stacked chairs extend, and the 1.6' width remained the same as the chair width. It took little time to stack these chairs and move them into this area.

Here's what we found: for out 9'x6' storage space, we comfortably placed ninety chairs in it thanks to our stackable feature. If we wanted to place additional



chairs in this same closet space, we could add thirty more chairs – or three additional stacks – with very tight spacing between each stack, for a total usable space for one hundred and twenty chairs.



This stacking capability wouldn't be possible without our advanced joinery, unlike anything else on the market. The Eusitis Joint, which makes our seating near-impossible to destroy, ensures that tensile stress from stacking won't cause them to break. In fact, your chairs are guaranteed to last for twenty years minimum with the Eustis Joint, which is the longest warranty we've seen for beautifully made wood chairs.

In our line of stacking hardwood chairs, we can stack both side and arm chairs as needed. Arm

chairs can stack up to six high, while side chairs can stack up to eight or ten high; the stacking capabilities depend on the model and design. If you have a mix of side and arm chairs, they can be stacked together. In fact, they can be different models of Eustis Chairs and still stack fine! We send a quick guide with stacking chairs to show how to best take care of your chairs with stacking for storage, and are happy to offer further guidance at any time if so needed.



Next Steps
